2022 marked another landmark year for global investment in net zero. In the UK, we reaffirmed our commitment to climate action and the urgent need to limit global temperature rise to 1.5°C. We committed to accelerate efforts to reduce carbon emissions and embrace sustainable practices in line with our Net-Zero Strategy to reach net zero emissions by 2050 and leave a healthier planet for future generations.

Reaching this goal will be challenging and it's sobering to realise that just over 300 months remain until 2050. We must plan effectively – with urgency, but also with hope – for that net zero future.

The overriding objective of the UK's COP26 Presidency was to keep 1.5°C alive. As COP26 President Alok Sharma said at the end of the Conference, "1.5°C is alive, but its pulse is weak", and will only be delivered with concerted and immediate global efforts over the next decade.

As COP28 looms – the first ever global stocktake of our progress against the Paris Agreement – we must use this moment to galvanise a step change in action and ambition to deliver on the Glasgow Climate Pact.

The UK hopes to see:

- 1) Ambition and action on keeping 1.5°C alive, including through new NDCs and sectoral commitments,
- 2) Demonstration that the oil and gas industry is ready to play its full part in transitioning to a low carbon economy globally,
- 3) Delivery of the trillions, public and private, needed to finance and accelerate the net zero transition,
- 4) Enhanced global resilience to current and future climate impacts, and
- 5) Protection and restoration of our natural assets by better integrating solutions to the twin climate and biodiversity crises in national climate plans.

The UK and Singapore are working closely to support each other in the achievement of our decarbonisation targets, and to secure the huge economic benefits of the green economy through the UK-Singapore Green Economy Framework (GEF), signed earlier this year. The GEF has been designed and will be delivered in partnership with business and academic communities. This kind of real world collaboration and collective action is vital if we are to meet the goals of the Paris Agreement and the Glasgow Climate Pact.

With the GEF in place, we must now focus our efforts to ensure it results in ambitious outcomes for the planet and for the economy. We know the economic case for action is on our side – the overall costs and risks of global warming mean we are at a risk of losing between 5-20% of our global GDP every year, but transition to the green economy will leverage around £100 billion of private investment and support up to 480,000 jobs, and see an opportunity worth £1 trillion for British businesses in low carbon products and services by 2030.

I look forward to finalising the GEF Work Plan later this year, in partnership with UK and Singapore businesses and academia – which will set out how we will work together to deliver on our green economy ambitions.

It's a great opportunity for the team to see the importance of this agenda, and for our members to see our efforts linked to tangible output. Our outputs are linked to the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals, and this is enriched in our culture as a Chamber.

In 2019, we became a carbon neutral Chamber of Commerce, offsetting our operational C02 emissions, and we continue to do this with a plan in place to reduce our carbon footprint. This was easier during the two years of the pandemic, and we are realistic about our goals. Thank you to the Swire Shipping team who have once again helped the Chamber to calculate our Scope 1, 2 and 3 footprint for the calendar year, including our flights, office energy consumption, travel to, catering at, and logistics of the Chamber events we held throughout the year. They have also helped us to offset the result by including us in their internal voluntary carbon offsetting scheme.

It is not just about the Environmental part of the ESG agenda. We have our Equality and Sustainability commitment, recognising diversity and inclusion across our activities. We actively seek a diverse range of voices in gender and opinions across our content and this stretches from our Board, through our committees and down to our events. We do our best to be as inclusive as possible when selecting external venues for our events, from accessibility to menu design, through to seating plans.

The discussions around the recently announced UK-Singapore Green Economy Framework have been welcomed by the Chamber and our business community. Working with the team at the British High Commission in Singapore, our Energy & Utilities, Transport Logistics & Supply Chain, Sustainability, Built Environment and Financial & Fintech business committees have been engaging to provide the voice of business for shaping the three core pillars covering Green Finance & Carbon Markets, Energy Transition, and, Green Transportation. We will contintue to support this agreement and ensure that business have the opportunity to get involved and shape a better world for us to live in in the future.

The British Chamber of Commerce Singapore (BritCham) is an independent not-for-profit membership organisation supporting approximately 3,500 members from 300 member organisations, part of the British Chambers of Commerce Global Network and a leading member of the Britain in South East Asia network (BiSEA) group. Our members vary from startups and SMEs to global MNCs, spanning all sectors and industries. Approximately two-thirds of the network in Singapore are British nationals or those employed by an organisation headquartered in the UK.

The Chamber is a registered Society, led by an Executive Team, overseen by an elected Board of members and operating under a published Constitution. Our mission is to drive British business growth in Singapore, create opportunities for our members, facilitate industry knowledge sharing, and support exporters from the UK. This is achieved by working alongside Government, our partners and our engaged members to deliver services, committee participation, activities and opportunities throughout the year.

The Chamber offers membership types to suit companies at all stages of an organisation's growth journey. 



BALANCING OUR CARBON IMPACTS




We have offset 16 tonnes of carbon produced by our activities in 2022 through engaging in Cathay Pacific's Fly Greener Programme.

Carbon Offset Certificate

This certificate acknowledges that

British Chamber of Commerce Singapore

has offset 16 tonnes of carbon through Cathay Pacific's Fly Greener Programme.

The emissions were offset through 4 different projects namely: the cook stoves replacement project in Bangladesh, the solar water heating project in India, the Sichuan household biodigesters project in China and the Henan solar-powered cookers project in China. These projects are certified under the Gold Standard to ensure that they are verifiable, credible and make a difference to local communities and the environment.





Our members told us during 2022 in our regular workforce poll that their biggest recruitment obstacles were the size of the talent pool, availability of talent with the requisite technical skills or market knowledge, and the salary expectations of the market.

Our important Future of Work theme provides opportunities throughout the year for the Chamber to update businesses on key changes such as the COMPASS framework and Overseas Networks and Expertise Pass, both announced during 2022, and to provide platforms for debate and discussion.

The UK concluded negotiations to join the CPTPP, and a new Memorandum of Understanding on a Green Economy Framework has been signed between the two countries.




Through our <u>Future of Trade</u> theme, the Chamber continues to ensure members receive updates on this critical milestones and what this may mean for their business.

Each year the Chamber polls members several times to understand the challenges and opportunities of their business and specific sector. Beyond comparable metrics, we also seek to understand perspectives on talent issues and CSR priorities.

During 2022, signs of post-covid recovery for businesses were clear as the year progressed, while costs and talent-related issues rose to the forefront of concerns.


In the early months of the year travel and employee mental health remained a significant issue as Covid rules continued, with members navigating travel based on vaccination status and limitation in supply. By July, the cost-of-living increase and talent issues had replaced travel as the top concerns. As one member stated at the time - "Industries are picking up, but access to talent remains one of the biggest business concerns."





Each year we publish our Guide to International Schools, profiling the options for parents in Singapore and just over the border in Malaysia, which has become a sought-after resource for parents considering the move to our region or transferring their children between schools.

In 2022 we launched the first of our Guide to Higher Education Study e-publications, showcasing British University offerings in the UK, through distance learning, and those with campuses here in Singapore
